
My daddy is bigger than me, twice as big at least.




My daddy loves me. He tells me that he does. Sometimes he holds me real close.




I wake my daddy up in the morning. Sometimes he likes it and sometimes he doesn't.




Daddy goes to work. I don't like that. I like him to stay home and play with me.




When daddy comes home we play. Sometimes he's my horsey. Sometimes we wrestle. We play all kinds of games.




In the winter daddy pulls me in my sled. We build snowmen and throw snowballs. My daddy loves me. He tells me that he does.




When it starts to get warm I help my daddy plant a garden. Then we watch the plants grow.




We go for walks in the woods and see the birds and animals.



When it gets hot out I go swimming with my daddy and we play outside.






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
Daddy said I started to have rules when I learned to crawl and walk. I could not touch some things, like the stove, because I might burn myself. I could not go near the steps or climb up on things because I might fall and hurt myself. Daddy said I couldn't understand too well then.

I couldn't hardly even talk.


When I learned to talk daddy said I had more rules. I had to learn to say things to be polite like "please", and "thankyou" and "you're welcome". Daddy said I'm growing up. Now there are even more rules. Some rules, like not touching the stove, are made so I don't hurt myself. Some rules, like saying "please", are made to help me get along with people. Rules, like picking up my toys, help me get along with people and keep me from being hurt. If I pick up my toys someone else won't have to do it for me. Besides. it's easy to fall over toys that aren't where they should be.




I can ride a tricycle now, but I am only allowed to ride to the end of the driveway. Daddy said that is because there are big cars in the street. They might not see me or I might go too far away and get lost.



Daddy said when I grow bigger and bigger I'll be able to do more and more. I'll be able to ride a bike.



When I get even bigger I'll be able to drive a car. Some rules I have now, like only being able to go to the end of the driveway, I won't have then. But some rules, like saying "please" and "thankyou", will always be the same.



My daddy loves me. He tells me that he does. Daddy said he makes rules for me because he loves me. He doesn't want me to be hurt and he wants me to get along with other people. Daddy said if I understood about rules maybe I wouldn't be sad when I have to obey them. Daddy said when I grow up really big I'll be able to make my own rules. I won't need all of his anymore.



This book may be read on several levels. At first glance it is the story of a close relationship between a father and his son. At this level it is enjoyable and entertaining for the youngest and oldest reader.

It also has practical value in that it helps young children and their parents understand why we have rules and can't always do anything we please in society.

The deepest meaning of the story deals with God's relationship with His people, both historically and personally. A pattern unfolds in the Bible showing that God's chosen people went through basic stages of innocence (in which there was no law) and later responsibility (in which a covenant relationship and law were introduced). But, innocence does not last and law is not an end in itself. God's desire is that we become mature and be like He is.

A good parable has many facets. It has personal truth and meaning for everyone that hears it. We hope this particular one has had a positive influence on you and helped you to understand God's ways.

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
